We have many needs in our church. If you would be willing to prepare a meal, when needed, please contact Ann Burns.



A little history of Churchland School
The General Assembly of 1907 enacted a
law providing for a system of public high
schools in North Carolina. Churchland
cosolidated the first high school in Davidson
County. Churchland was placed on the
accreditated list of high schools during
1919. This entitled anyone graduating from
the institution to a first grade teacher's
certificate without exmination. The high
school building was erected in 1920. In
1922 one of the first and finest teacher

training academies in the state was started at Churchland. A remodeling program began in the early 1950's. To keep the school up to standard a new gym was erected in 1951. A new cafeteria and primary building was completed in 1967. A major change in organization saw our high school consolidate with Reeds and Tyro in 1958 at the West Davidson site (which is now Tyro Middle School). In 1974 the state Kindergarten class was began at Churchland. The next step of reorganization was initiated in 1975. Churchland Elementary now serves kindergarten through fifth grades.



April WMU Mission Drive: Annie Armstrong Easter Offering:

Who is Annie?

Annie was born in Baltimore Md. In the 1850's and at a time women had very little opportunity to a successful future. Yet her devotion to Christ led her to a life of service and leadership. She organized women to pray, to give and meet

the needs around them. She challenged pastors and churches to action to support missionaries. Annie Armstrong was unstoppable in her passion for missions and she was recognized as a national Southern Baptist trailblazer for her visionary leadership that still inspires millions today.

Here are some of her contributions that Annie Armstrong accomplished until her death in 1938.

Started Bay view Mission for Baltimore's poor and addicted.

Served as the first executive of Woman's Missionary Union.

Led the formation of missions' organizations for children.

Raised support for missionaries to Italian and Jewish immigrants.

Refused a salary because she would never give to the Lord "that which costs me nothing." (2 Samuel 24:24).

Initiated fund-raising "brick cards" to build churches in Cuba.

Gained support for the first black, female missionaries.

Secured funds to relieve China missionary, Lottie Moon, who had served on the mission field for years without a furlough.

Advocated for Native Americans and the poor mountain areas.

She had a saying, "What a glorious thing it is to be a co-worker with God in winning the world for Christ."
