<u>LOTTIE MOON CHRISTMAS OFFERING – DECEMBER 2024 – GOAL \$800</u>

Every Christmas we come together to collect money for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

Lottie Moon was a strong young woman sent as a Southern Baptist Missionary to China from 1873-1912.

Let me tell you a little about Lottie before all this happened in her life. She was a rebellious young girl at the age of 13 and this may have been because her father died and she had great bitterness toward God. She did not like church, she would not go to church. She was like this until her college years and as a joke to some of her friends that kept asking her to go to missionary meetings she went one night with them. But at that meeting the Holy Spirit showed her how ugly her spirit was. After praying all night, she confessed her bad behavior to God and to others. On December 1858 she was baptized at First Baptist Church in Charlottesville, Virginia. She gave her heart to God and wanted to commit to becoming a missionary. She worked very hard in college and graduated with a Master's Degree in 1861, which was unheard of in that day for women. She stayed close to home during the Civil War but for a few years she taught school in KY., GA., and VA.

In October, Lottie Moon sailed as a Southern Baptist Missionary to China. She arrived in Tonchow, Northern China on October 7, 1873. She left behind a proposal of marriage, her job, her home and family to do God's work. Her path was not typical for an educated women from a wealthy Southern family. God had called her to a place where people were in need for a Savior.

For 39 years Lottie spent most of the time in Tengchow and P'ingtu. People feared her and did not like her, but she refused to leave. The aroma of fresh-baked cookies drew people to her house. She didn't just serve the people of China, she identified with them by dressing as they did and learning their language and customs. Many eventually accepted her. And some accepted her Savior.

Lottie's letters to home told of the urgency need for more missionaries to come and more support through prayer and giving.

Disease, turmoil and lack of co-workers threatened to undo Lottie's Work. But she gave herself completely to God, helping lay the foundation of what will become the modern Chinese Church, one of the fastest growing Christian movements in the world. Lottie Moon died at the age of 72, December 14, 1912 in Kobe Harbor, Japan.

But her legacy lives on. And today when gifts aren't growing as quickly as the number of workers being called to the field by God, her call for giving rings with more urgency than ever. Please consider giving to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering through the month of December 2024.
